


FLTF Information Webinar Recap January 22, 2025

FLTF held their 51st informational webinar on January 22, 2025. The webinar was 2 hours and included a question-and-answer (Q&A) session for almost an hour. We encourage you to listen / watch the webinar <u>https://www.four-lakes-taskforce-mi.com/events.html</u>

We provide the following recap. For those that follow our regular communications, some of this has been shared by us before. For others, we hope to connect a few dots to this complicated issue.

Current Situation

- Due to HCA legal action FLTF cannot issue bonds to continue work and construction is forced to suspend.
- Both the Circuit Court and MI Court of Appeals have DENIED <u>all</u> HCA claims due to "lack of credible evidence."
- Construction can restart once the HCA legal challenges are resolved. At this point, the federal courts
 have two motions to rule on and HCA needs to decide if they will accept the MI Court of Appeals
 decision or file to be heard by the MI Supreme Court. The MI Supreme Court does not need to accept
 their case.



With construction stalled, property owners appear to be interested in two things: TIME and MONEY.

Construction can restart once the HCA legal challenges are resolved. At this point, the federal courts have two motions to rule on and HCA needs to decide if they will accept the MI Court of Appeals decision.

The HCA delay has caused a one-year delay to this point; depending on how things proceed, construction either restarts or there is at least a second year of delay.

Based on the Q&A session, we should prepare ourselves for the FALL 2025 Restart. HCA has until late February to appeal to the MI Supreme Court. Assuming they do, things may be tied up for months.

If HCA does not, then starting in early March FLTF will need to coordinate construction crews to return and the issuance of bonds. Bond issuance may require up to 90 days - - - many unknowns to manage with contractors and their schedules. Should HCA share their intention to accept the MI Appeals Court ruling that could save a couple of months making the Early Start 2025 possible.

MONEY Back to 2023 \rightarrow

FLTF indicated in 2023 that the State of MI Grant money would be exhausted in mid-2024 and bond financing was required to finish Secord and Smallwood. FLTF indicated due to permitting challenges, State of MI funds would need to be used at Edenville. Permitting issues with Edenville **DO NOT impact Secord, Smallwood, or Sanford** as these three dams are fully permitted and under construction. In 2023, FLTF planned to proceed with an \$80 million Bond by June 1, 2024, to fund the Secord and Smallwood project through 2024.

The transition of Secord, Smallwood, and Sanford to bond funds in 2024 would allow more of the remaining State of Michigan grant to be used for Edenville to keep to its current schedule, as Edenville cannot be financed until there is certainty surrounding the permit. During this webinar, FLTF explained in detail the Edenville permitting challenges and where they are in the process at Edenville.

Despite what Facebook says:

- 1) FLTF reiterated again the Edenville permitting challenges **DO NOT** impact Secord, Smallwood, or Sanford.
- 2) FLTF also emphasized again that Smallwood and Secord will be filled when EGLE indicates construction is complete. Filling of the northern lakes is NOT contingent on Edenville or Sanford being completed.

CAPITAL ASSESSMENT \rightarrow

In December 2023, FLTF explained the construction estimate was \$364.3 Million with a Contingency of \$34.6 Million creating a NOT TO EXCEED construction estimate of \$398.8 Million. This estimate included bids for Secord, Smallwood, and Sanford. A forecast was used to estimate Edenville as they had not been bid yet. The State of MI Grant of \$180 Millon is subtracted leaving a NOT TO EXCEED amount to be assessed of \$217.7 Million.

February 2024, FLTF and the Counties approved the NOT TO EXCEED construction assessment following the process outlined by the law. The courts have agreed the FLSAD is valid and legal.

In March 2024, FLTF announced the Edenville bid was LOWER than forecast and the construction estimate was adjusted downward to \$353.6 Million representing a **reduction** of \$10.7 Million versus the December 2023 estimate and \$45.2 Million less than the NOT TO EXCEED. This should have been celebrated as good news, but the HCA legal challenges clouded the conversations at the time.

FLTF reiterated what they had stated last year - - the legal appeal by HCA forced construction to suspend. Assuming the legal challenges conclude soon, and construction can begin in EARLY 2025, the cost of the delay will be between \$10 - \$20 Million.

The cost of the delay of up to \$20 Million is unfortunate as it will dilute the costs savings outlined above. FLTF did indicate if construction cannot begin in EARLY 2025, they expect the cost of delay to increase.

Before we leave the assessment topic - - - FLTF addressed the Facebook rumor they can increase the assessment by 10% a year. This is NOT TRUE. The law and special assessment guidelines are extremely specific in this area regarding the FLSAD.

FLTF also provided an update on their continuous efforts to seek additional grants to reduce costs for ALL property owners. As we have stated in the past \rightarrow The HCA legal challenges make it difficult for our elected officials at the state and federal level to secure additional support. A common requirement of grants is the organization must not be encumbered with a lawsuit and needs to have the ability to provide required matching funds (for instance, the \$200 million MI grant requires a 20% match).

During the Q&A session, there were questions regarding the assessment. FLTF will have more information regarding the assessment once the HCA legal challenges conclude.

- Property owners have interest in paying their capital assessment upfront to avoid interest (answer is YES).
- Property owners asked if they could pay a larger chunk of their capital assessment over a couple of years to retire it to avoid future interest (the answer is YES).
- Property owners asked if enough people pay their capital assessment upfront in full, would that provide FLTF with funds to continue construction (FLTF indicated they are looking at all options to move forward).
- FLTF indicated they plan to develop a program with a foundation to provide annual assessment assistance to <u>homestead</u> property owners that meet certain financial criteria. Our lake association has an interest in participating in this program. More details come.
- FLTF supports an initiative to get the Special Assessment Deferment Program approved by the State.
